At Waikōwhai Intermediate, we try to dispel the common misunderstanding around ‘**inquiry**’ as a subject or a noun, and instead encourage our students to understand that it is a process: it is a *doing* word. We learn through inquiring, through sparking our wonderment, and by asking questions. It is a skill that is not only necessary for success in the classroom, but is also an essential life skill. We follow the ‘Spiral of Inquiry’ model, which acts as a guide through the stages of the inquiry process. At Waikōwhai Intermediate it is our goal that every child will be motivated and engaged in all things **literacy**, developing strengths in literacy in order to take part in day-to-day life. Therefore, our programmes will include; differentiated instruction, a range of teaching strategies, authentic learning contexts, evidenced based targeted support, collaborative opportunities, use of thinking tools and IT. Learning Maps are fully utilised and literacy goals are shared with reflections gathered and acted upon. Specialist Classes

Visual Arts at Waikōwhai is about students being active risk takers. The Arts curriculum supports inquiry learning where students are encouraged to 'think outside the box' and engage with possibly unexpected outcomes or uncover several solutions to a problem. Performing Arts takes place in our dedicated Performing Arts suite. It is an opportunity for students to learn, grow and express themselves in dance, drama and music. Inclusive Education

The goal at Waikōwhai Intermediate is to ensure students with **Special Education Needs** receive the support they need by providing opportunities to enhance their learning through successful coordination of services, effective teaching practices, efficient and experienced support staff and engaging programmes that are meaningful and consist of well-scaffolded resources.

It is the intention of Waikōwhai Intermediate to provide all students with the opportunity to improve their literacy at their own level. Our **support programmes** offered are Rainbow Reading, Fast Forward and Steps for Literacy. These programmes are based on research proven methodology and resources. At Waikōwhai Intermediate, the **ESOL** lessons support the integration of newly arrived students into our school. Students from diverse language backgrounds are equipped with skills to participate successfully in mainstream classrooms. Extension Programmes

It is important to us that all students reach their potential and we therefore offer a wide range of gifted and talented classes. There are **extension programmes** in science, mathematics, dance, art, food technology, chess, robotics and languages (Japanese, Chinese and French). Most of these classes are clustered on a Friday so they do not interfere with normal classroom programmes.

Arts and Culture

Art extension is a platform where Year 8 students can build on their previous experiences and create art works of increasing sophistication and complexity. With time on their side they are able to further explore and celebrate their artistic expression.

Dance Extension provides students with a talent in dance to extend themselves in this area, through a variety of forms of dance. Dance extension takes place in the dance studio in the performing arts suite.

We have **Kapa Haka** every Monday to practice waiata, moteatea and haka. Kapa Haka is the term for Māori performing arts and literally means to form a line (**kapa**) and dance (**haka**). At Waikōwhai Intermediate we are able to provide our students the opportunity and experience to learn Māori language and culture through waiata and performance. Students will be able to showcase their ability to enjoy the movements, sights and sounds of learning a culture. “Kia kōrero te katoa o te tinana” - *Henare Teowai*. “The whole body should speak!” - Timena Muna muna@wai-int.school.nz

Our **rock band** has won the Bandquest competition on a number of occasions in the past. Each year students come with skill, talent and enthusiasm and are moulded together into a successful band that makes the most of their individual talents. **Musiqhub** is also on site to provide itinerant music lessons. Waitunes Choir is a large inclusive group that gives students the opportunity to learn about and experience the joy of choral singing.

Waifest is a festival that celebrates Waikōwhai Intermediate’s many **cultural groups**. Tongan, Samoan, Cook Island, Bollywood, Hip Hop, K-pop, Contemporary and Jazz dance groups and **many** others perform at this festival in term 1.

School Production is another very special event that puts many of our students on stage and in the spotlight.

Sport and Outdoor Education

Waikōwhai Intermediate is a member of the (AAIMS) Association of Auckland Intermediates and Middle Schools Year 7 & 8 Sporting Organisation. AAIMS is made up of 9 Zones across greater Auckland and Waikowhai is part of the **Central Zone**. At a Central Zone level, we are able to compete against 25 schools in our area in a wide variety of sports. These sports are Tennis, Softball, Cricket, Swimming, Orienteering, Kilikiti, League Tag, Rugby Sevens, Futsal, Football, Rugby, Hockey, Table Tennis, Netball, Basketball, Rugby League, Cross Country, Gymnastics, Volleyball, Touch Rugby, Badminton, Athletics and Golf. These sports are held on a separate single day throughout the year. Each sport has a different composition when it comes to tournament divisions. For the most part each sport is separated by gender but on some occasions this can be Year Group specific as well.

Outside of Central Zone/AAIMS we also have two sports that are involved in weekly competitions. These are Waterpolo and Netball.

We are aware that some of our students have sporting talents that are not covered by AAIMS and we are very willing to help in any way to support any sport that these students undertake. – Pooja Bhikha bhikha@wai-int.school.nz

For those less competitive - Every Tuesday and Thursday lunchtime (weather permitting) we have WaiRunners - this is an opportunity for fitness and well-being, where students run or walk around the park adjacent to the school.

Outdoor Education also plays a valuable role in our school. Each year our Year 7 classes are invited to attend a **camp** at Finlay Park, Lake Karapiro in the Waikato. The Year 8 classes experience **Surf Safety** sessions at the beginning of the year and then experience a week of activities at the end of the year.
